Birthday time!



Speech Competition

The children have continued their positive start to the term and our big focus over the last week has been completing the draft writing and then fine tuning their speeches. They may ask you to help them find props or they may wish to dress in some way that suits their speech, this is absolutely fine. Any props used need to be linked to a point in the speech and used at the correct time to emphasise this. If dressing up is going to be used, please help your child to be comfortable in the outfit so they are not distracted or fiddling with some part of it, as we want to avoid costume mishaps!

Be an Upstander!

Last Friday our classroom was filled with bright and happy colours for "Pink Shirt Day". To follow up on our learning around being an UPSTANDER when we see mean behaviour and actions, we have learnt about giving compliments. The tips that the children have learnt are

- Say things that are true: people quickly pick up on compliments that aren't true!
- Focus on strengths, qualities, and characteristics instead of appearances.

This week we have really made an effort to be confident and to give the gift of a compliment to others. I have encouraged the children to tell people what they notice they are good at doing and what qualities and characteristics they appreciate about them. It would be great to see this practice continue at home.

Classroom Culture

Life in the senior room has been a little different for the children with a variety of teachers working with the class. Mrs Paterson has been teaching for the last 3 weeks as Miss Flintoff was away and Mrs Hazlett works in our class every Thursday this term. Both of these teachers and myself touch base daily to check in with child well being, focus, effort and attitude and the system we have is working well from an adults point of view.

I am however finding I am doing a bit of a general mop up on behaviours that do not suit our school or classroom values. I have emphasised to the children that we (the senior class) are the school leaders and that whatever behaviours we show, the rest of the school follows. So for example, turning a game of tennis into a game of brand ball is not ok at school as this then took 10 minutes to collect all the hit balls about the place and made children very late to class. This is fairly minor but I am working to nip minor actions like this in the bud before they grow.

A strength of our school is our ability to work together for the good of all and to make decisions with other people's feelings in mind. So please remind your children to

- Make the decisions that are best for that situation and to seek adult guidance if needed talk to the classroom or duty teacher.
- To make a decision that they would be proud of Mrs Duncan and you to see.
- To be honest in what they say to myself and others.

NZ Sign Language

Recently it was the official 'NZSL Week' and during this time the seniors started brushing up on their sign language skills. The children really enjoyed this and so I have continued this on. We are currently working through a series of short lessons that have been provided by NZSL online. Each day that I am working with the children we practice using our classroom TV and our expert teacher Angela Francis. NZSL is a clever way of communication and everyone is able to fingerspell, ask basic questions and respond with short sentences. The beauty of sign is that the communication is not just via the hands, the whole body is involved with posturing and facial expression. This is great as it links in well with our speeches which require similar skills.

We are also going to be meeting up with Libby Francis online and learning some more sign skills with her. We are all looking forward to this.

Weekly sports catch up

I am enjoying hearing from the children how their various sporting activities have gone. There have been some big scores posted by Maniototo teams in hockey and rugby recently! This is a lovely opportunity again for children to speak in front of the school (we have been doing these catch ups on a Monday after Rosary) and I like hearing about what else they have been up to outside of school life.

We had commented last week that the children are starting to look tired. I feel it goes hand in hand with term 2 and sports travel. Please continue to do all the great work that you do at home with having a good routine with homework, good sleep and being well organised as these positive efforts by you impact the children at school. I appreciate your efforts with these aspects of school - home life. In turn, I take the time every day to really look at the children to gauge how they are and I adjust my teaching style and content to meet different needs.

20% discount for additional family members, pay \$120 (or \$28/day). Attend both camps and get 33% off the 2nd camp, i.e. pay \$100.

This five day holiday camp from Monday 12 to Friday 16 July (10am to 3pm) is suitable for those aged 8 years and older. It will include a luge race on 16 July (at 10am).

The camp takes place at the Naseby Adventure Park. Each day participants receive three instructed sessions, one each for figure skating, ice hockey and luge, and there are also opportunities to try Bavarian curling.

Single day attendance is permitted. The camp is a day camp and there is accommodation available in Naseby.

Things to know about the camp are:

- · Clothing it is winter and we are outside. Warm tighter fitting clothing, thermal underwear is a must, and try to avoid bulky jackets. Layers are always good. Tighter fitting sweat pants or tights over long-johns work really well.
- · Footwear we supply luge boots and skates. Runners are fine for curling but bring a change of socks. No qumboots!
- · Gloves essential, ski/snowboard gloves are fine but they will take a battering on the ice so bring old ones rather than new ones. Having two pairs is good as they get wet.
- · Helmets we have a supply of helmets but if you have a ski/snowboard helmet please bring it along.
- · Lunch we stop for an hour for lunch (noon) and use the Patearoa Lounge at the Ice Rink to eat in and also keep our dry clothes, bags etc. Bring a healthy lunch which can be supplemented with food and drinks from the canteen which has pies, chips, soup, toasted sandwiches etc and a range of drinks, so bring a few \$\$\$ for that. The canteen volunteers will also heat up food if they are asked nicely.
