Junior Class News:


Wow Week 7 already.

Champion yourself to a positive mindset

I have been encouraging the children to have a positive mindset. We need someone to encourage us and for children that will come from our parents in the first instance, but we can also do this for ourselves.

I have been working with the children to use daily internally spoken words to develop this. We are deliberately speaking out who we want to be. Some of the phrases that we use are ...

- I have a great mind,
- I am a valuable person,
- My life is full of possibilities,
- I will do my best at my learning,
- I am proud of myself for trying,
- I am good at making friends,
- I am open and ready to learn,
- Let's take a chance.

Teaching children the power of positive self-talk early is a great way to build resilience for any challenge and can help in building confidence. When using positive self-talk, we are training the brain to frame situations in terms of our strengths.

I would like to encourage you to use this tool with your children at home.

'Keeping Ourselves Safe' has been our topic in the senior room this term.

So far we have been learning how to read different situations and different ways we can react to keep ourselves and friends safe. We have also learnt about being responsible for other people and when this might/could occur. We have also looked at the different types of abuse there is and learned that abuse is never the victim's fault and it is never okay. The students have enjoyed the activities associated with Keeping Ourselves Safe such as role plays. We are looking forward to having Constable Garry Milford in our classroom for two lessons.

NZ Sign Language

We can now sign basic conversations, so encourage your child to teach you some sign language. It is a beautiful and effective communication tool - so get amongst it!

NOTIFICATION OF ATTENDANCE DUES RATES 2022

FOR KAVANAGH COLLEGE, ST PETER'S COLLEGE, VERDON COLLEGE, ST KEVIN'S COLLEGE AND ALL CATHOLIC PRIMARY SCHOOLS OF THE DIOCESE OF DUNEDIN

The annual diocesan review of attendance dues rates has been completed, and after taking account of roll numbers, school mortgages and additional insurance costs, small adjustments have been made for 2022. Increases have been kept to a minimum and are in line with increased costs at a national level.

For 2022, the following rates will apply:

Primary Rate: (Year 1 - 8 pupils) \$465.00 per annum, incl. 15% GST. (\$116.25 per term) Secondary Rate: (Year 9 - 13 pupils) \$900.00 per annum, incl. 15% GST. (\$225.00 per term)

Attendance Dues are paid to the Proprietor (legal owner) of an Integrated School because the provision of land, buildings and associated facilities are our responsibility as a Catholic community.

What does the State fund from taxation?

The State is responsible for providing funding for salaries, school operational grants and major maintenance of integrated school buildings. These expenses for our 28 schools, paid by the State, cost \$30 million per annum.

The Board of Trustees, is the Crown entity responsible for the good governance of a school, and administers such funds (including minor maintenance) on behalf of the State.

The Government grant for major maintenance (Policy One) is administered by the Proprietor.

What does the Proprietor fund from Attendance Dues?

The Bishop, as Proprietor, and acting on our behalf as a Catholic community, must meet from Attendance Dues the annual servicing costs of existing mortgages on all 28 diocesan owned schools, insurance costs, and other associated cost as agreed to with the Minister of Education as part of the Integration of each school into the State system.
