Kia ora koutou,

Welcome to our first school newsletter since we went into Lockdown on Tuesday 17th August at 11.59 pm. In between times, we have had two class newsletters that went out via email to the children. These two newsletters were good reading and were a great opportunity for the children to share their own stories and poems from their bubbles, and for the rest of us to get some delicious baking recipes to try. I was very pleased with the work that the children contributed to this and of course, I loved hearing from the children.

Lockdown learning went really well and I was very happy with the work that the children completed. A highlight for me each day was the Google Meets that I had with members of the class, our daily turnout was high and it gave the children a very authentic opportunity to practice their 'online meeting' skills such as ...

- Organisational skills to turn up on time
- Prior preparation skills with organising themselves with daily news, weather updates, jokes, weird facts and chat activities
- Knowing how to set the screen up so that their face could be seen and the background wasn't too dark or distracting
- How to work turning the mic on and off at the appropriate time
- Showing respect and interest through our facial expressions and eye contact
- How to speak up, wait our turn and contribute to an online conversation
- And of course, it was a great opportunity for us to socially connect with each other from our homes which was good for us emotionally and mentally.

The reality is that online meetings will be a norm in our children's lives, so learning these skills now is a bonus for them.

Being in the classroom is the best way for us to connect and learn, but we showed that we are adaptable and that learning online is something that we can manage with a pretty high degree of independence. Ka pai.
