A reminder that daylight saving time ends on Sunday 7th April and clocks need to be put back one hour.



Teacher Only Day - Tuesday 4th June




Can you believe we are heading towards the last week of term?! We have been spoilt this term with Anniversary Day and Easter holidays to recharge our batteries.


Are you going overseas for the school holidays?

When you return, you can now complete a digital **New Zealand Traveller Declaration** (**NZTD**) before you fly back into New Zealand – replacing the need to fill out a paper declaration card on the plane.

Everyone coming into New Zealand needs to complete an NZTD. You'll answer questions about your trip and what's in your bags. You can complete it at a time that suits you, on the <u>NZTD</u> <u>website</u> or by downloading the <u>NZTD app</u>, and submit it 24 hours before your trip back to New Zealand.
