We were lucky enough to have the Year 6's come and teach us how to play Cornhole. This is one of the games that the PTA has purchased for the school. It was a lot of fun!




You have to throw your bean bags into the hole to get maximum points.

I have signed up the senior class for Farmer Time New Zealand, an educational programme run by Sheep and Beef NZ that brings farming directly into the classroom through Google Meets. Our farmer is Hamish Dunlop, who farms a sheep and beef property at Ararata near Hawera in inland Taranaki. We will chat with him a few times each term and learn about what is happening on his farm. I am excited about this.

Each year, the group has completed different tasks in preparation for this. The Year 8's made a slideshow to share with him about our school, community and the Maniototo. The year 7's found out about his area and the Taranaki. The year 6 wrote a letter to his children (to which they got a reply from his daughter, who is in Year 8) and came up with questions for him to answer. This programme will help us further understand the journey of food from farm to fork in the ever-changing agricultural industry.


